Before You Get Started

The “Before You Apply to a K-12 School” Workbook takes you through the steps of choosing and applying to elementary, middle and high schools in Philly.

Use this workbook to identify what you want in a school, which schools fit your needs, and how to apply. Bring this with you on school visits and take notes.

District Schools

District schools are free public schools operated by the School District of Philadelphia. To apply to a school outside of your assigned neighborhood school, you must submit an application through the School Selection Process on schoolselect.philasd.org. You can select up to five options, so choose carefully where to apply.

Citywide-Admission Schools

Sometimes have GPA or attendance requirements, but are generally easier to get into than special-admission schools. Students must apply and are selected through a lottery system.

High schools only: All Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs are citywide-admissions and do not have entrance requirements for incoming students.

Special-Admission (Magnet) Schools

Have academic, behavioral and attendance requirements. Students must apply and generally must have high scores on PSSAs, especially in 7th grade for high school admission. They may require additional application materials, such as essays or interviews. Schools review student applications and issue acceptances or rejections.

Neighborhood Schools

Are automatically open to students living in the school's "catchment" or neighborhood zone. If you live within the catchment, your student is given preference to attend. To attend your designated neighborhood school, register directly with the school with proof of residency to enroll. To attend a different neighborhood school, students must apply.

Kindergarten only: District schools have limited space for Kindergarten and open for registration on a specific timeline. To ensure a space at your neighborhood school, register as early as possible. See pages 21-22 for the Kindergarten timeline and instructions to register.

TIP

Pay attention to a school's grade levels — you often have a higher chance of admission at the lowest grade level. For example, if a school serving grades 6–12 already has an 8th-grade class, it may have limited spaces for new 9th graders to enroll; however, there may be more open spaces in the 6th grade.

Charter Schools

Charter schools are free, independently operated public schools. They cannot have academic or behavioral requirements for admission, and there is no application fee. You can apply to as many charter schools as you like.

All charter schools require an application and many hold a lottery to fill their available spaces. If you are offered a spot, the school will contact you with steps to enroll. If you are not selected, you will be placed on the waitlist and must reapply the following year if you are not offered a seat from the waitlist. Many accept applications through Apply Philly Charter (applyphillycharter.org), due by January 25, 2021. Other charter schools have their own applications and deadlines. Visit greatphillyschools.org to find all charter school application deadlines.

Public Charter Citywide Schools

Enroll students from any part of the city, with a lottery to offer admission.

Public Charter Neighborhood (“Renaissance”) Schools

Enroll students in their neighborhood “catchment” boundaries. If they have additional open seats, students from outside of their neighborhood are selected through a lottery system.

Private Schools

Most private schools require students to apply for admission and generally charge an application fee. A large majority charge annual tuition, but financial aid and scholarships are often available. Schools will issue acceptance, waitlist, or rejection notices to families. Schools may be coed or single-sex, day school or boarding school, religious or non-sectarian.

Catholic Schools

Are open to students of all religions, though they promote Catholic values. The majority are operated by the Archdiocese of Philadelphia though some are organized by Independence Mission Schools or independently. The admissions requirements and deadlines vary by school, but some may require school records, entrance exams or interviews. See pages xiii-xiv for instructions to apply to Catholic Archdiocese schools.

Independent Schools

Are operated independently according to a wide range of instructional types. The admissions requirements and deadlines vary by school, but some may require entrance exams, interviews or religious affiliation.

TIP

Don't let a school's "sticker price" scare you off. Many of schools with the highest tuition also offer the most generous financial aid. If you're interested in a school, set up a time to discuss your options with the admissions director. Schools usually award financial aid on a rolling basis, so apply for aid early.



Step 1: Understand Your Timeline

It's never too soon to start looking for the right school! Knowing your timeline will help you stay on top of application deadlines the multi-step processes. For example, some schools require students to apply nearly a full year before the start of the school year. For other schools, such as private schools, applying early improves your chances of receiving financial aid.

Two to Three Years Before Enrolling in...

Kindergarten

Children Ages 2-4

High School

The Year Before Enrolling in a New School

September - November

ALL SCHOOLS

- Visit the virtual Philly High School Fair! No registration or passwords are required for this free virtual fair. For more information, including when the event will go live, see phillyhighschoolfair.com.
- Attend the Philly K-8 School Fair! For more information, including event details, visit phillyk8fair.com.
- Attend open houses or arrange for a visit during school hours.

DISTRICT

- Apply to District elementary, middle and high schools through the School Selection Process. You can apply to no more than five schools outside of your designated neighborhood school. Visit schoolselect.philasd.org to apply.

The Year Before Enrolling in a New School (Cont.)

September - November (Cont.)

CHARTERS

- Apply to charter schools participating in Apply Philly Charter (applyphillycharter.org) for fall 2021 between September 25, 2020 - January 25, 2021. Non-participating charter schools may also be accepting applications at this time.

PRIVATE

- Apply to private schools. Some may hold entrance and scholarship exams.
- Apply for private K-8 school scholarships through Children's Scholarship Fund Philadelphia (csfphiladelphia.org). The priority deadline is November 15, 2020 for the first lottery.

December - February

DISTRICT

- District schools with admissions criteria review applications and conduct interviews and auditions.
- Special-admission schools make admissions and waitlist decisions, while citywide schools run admissions lotteries for eligible students.
- The District notifies students about initial admissions decisions. Students must confirm their preferred school. For more information, including the timeline, visit philasd.org/studentplacement.
- District schools fill available seats with students from their waitlist. The final notifications are usually available in February. For more information, including the timeline, visit philasd.org/studentplacement.
- Kindergarten registration usually opens in late January for District neighborhood schools. Register early to ensure a placement, as seats are limited. See page 22 for more information.

CHARTERS

- Submit your applyphillycharter.org application by January 25, 2021. In February, outcomes will be available on Apply Philly Charter and also communicated directly by schools.
- Charters not participating in APC may also have deadlines during this time. For more information, visit greatphillyschools.org.

PRIVATE

- For financial aid to private schools, submit your financial aid application by December 31, 2020.
- Most private schools release acceptance, rejection or waitlist decisions.

March - May

ALL SCHOOLS

- Some schools (mostly charter and private) may still be accepting applications. Visit greatphillyschools.org for a list of schools with available seats.

DISTRICT

- Kindergarten registration usually closes in May for District neighborhood schools.
- To enroll at your designated neighborhood school, visit the school to register prior to the start of the school year. Call the school for more information.

CHARTERS

- Some charter schools may continue to accept applications and issue initial admissions decisions.

PRIVATE

- Apply for private K-8 school scholarships through Children's Scholarship Fund Philadelphia (csfphiladelphia.org). The final deadline is March 1, 2021 for the second lottery.



Step 2: Understand Your Needs

Use the following questions to help identify your student's strengths, weaknesses and needs.

Questions for Your Student	Questions for Caregivers

What would you need to succeed?• What are three things you want in a school (ex. music, art, special classes)?• Are sports important to you? Which ones?• Do you have any other talents or special interests?	<ul style="list-style-type: none">• Does your student read well or struggle with reading?• Does your student have any learning difficulties? Do they have an Individualized Education Program (IEP)?• What are three things you want in your student's school (ex. after-school programs)?• Does your student have any behavior issues? If so, what kind of environment would they need to thrive in?• Does your student need one-on-one support? What kinds of teachers does your student have the most success with?• Does your student do better in a large group setting or prefer smaller learning environments?



Step 3: Decide What's Important

From location, school values, special services or classes, and more, create a list of what you want in a school. Use the answers from step 2 to help you decide.



Step 4: Find and Compare Your Options

To find and compare hundreds of schools, use the GreatPhillySchools K-12 School Guide or visit greatphillyschools.org for even more information using your phone or computer. Write down your top school choices based on your search. Make notes of important information as you find schools so you can easily plan to visit when the time comes.



Step 5: Get to Know Schools

Once you have narrowed down your top choices, it's time to get to know schools. Try to speak with students and teachers to understand what it is like to attend and get a better sense of its environment. Ask the principal, admissions staff or school counselors about the school's academic expectations, their student to teacher ratio, how they know that teachers care about their students, and more. If you're not able to visit and see the school in person, call or email the school you are interested in. Some schools host many events virtually such as open houses, shadow days and info sessions so you can see what they have to offer without leaving your home.

Step 6: Apply to Schools

Once you have completed your visits and reviewed your notes, it's time to decide which school(s) to apply to. In the next pages, we have listed the basic procedures for applying to schools associated with the School District of Philadelphia, the Archdiocese of Philadelphia and Apply Philly Charter.

If you haven't heard anything back from a school after two weeks or so, follow up to make sure they have your application and any other required materials or information. Ask when you will receive an answer about whether your student will be accepted or enrolled.



TIP

Find a school's profile on [greatphillyschools.org](https://www.greatphillyschools.org) to learn about the school's admission requirements. Click the "Apply Now" button to apply.



TIP

Don't limit yourself! You can apply to more than one type of school, and applying does not necessarily mean your child must attend that school if they are admitted. You have the option of applying to multiple types of schools, and then making your choice later.





For Charter, Catholic and Private School Students:

Families not currently enrolled in a School District of Philadelphia school can apply directly to a District school using this online process.

It is important to provide a working email address to receive admissions decisions.



Note: Applications from current District students can be submitted until the deadline. Each new application will override all previously submitted applications.

Note: This application can not be changed or updated once it is submitted. Only your most recent submission will be considered.

The School District's online selection process is for students and families who wish to apply to any District school other than their designated neighborhood school, including all special-admission (magnet) and citywide-admission schools. Students can apply to up to five (5) different District K-12 schools.



(For current School District of Philadelphia parents only)

STEP 1: CREATE AN ACCOUNT OR LOG IN

- To create an account, all you need is an email address. Go to signup.philasd.org.
- If you already have a Parent & Family Portal account, go to philasd.org/login.



STEP 2: LINK TO YOUR STUDENT

- Once inside the Portal, make sure you have your student's ID number.
- Click on "My Students" to link to your student.



STEP 3: CLICK ON "SCHOOL SELECTION" TO SELECT SCHOOLS

- Once you have linked to your student, you can apply to schools.
- Click on "School Selection" to enter the application.
